
Via a PPA, Younity purchases power from community energy groups, no matter the size of generation. This means groups can:


Southern capacity compared to Midlands/North




Just Transition

During 2021, community energy groups provided energy efficiency grants worth £470,000 to over 4,500 recipients during 2021






